Team & Support

- The school also trains future teachers.

- Children can stay at school during lunch breaks. Strip cards and annual cards are available.
- The parental contribution is voluntary (€30 per child) and funds fun activities.
- School trips and camps are paid separately.
- No child is excluded if parents cannot pay.

Communication via Parro

- Parro is used for short messages and information.
- Absences must be reported by phone before 8:15 AM, not via Parro.
- Teachers do not read Parro messages during class time.

Birthdays & Treats

- Birthdays are celebrated in class.
- Treats should be small, healthy, and easy to distribute.
- No gifts.

Mobile Phones & Smartwatches

- Must be turned off and out of sight during class.
- Only allowed outside school hours.
- The school is not responsible for damage or loss.

Education & Support

- The school offers tailored education for every child.
- Extra help is available for students who struggle.
- Enrichment groups are available for students needing more challenge.
- Student progress is monitored through tests and conversations.
- Complex support needs are addressed with external experts.

Testing & Group 8 Advice

- Group 8 students take the national transition test in February.
- Final school advice is given in March.
- Students receive thorough guidance throughout the process.

M Student Participation

- Student council: children contribute ideas about school matters.
- Peer mediators: students help resolve conflicts.
- Peer tutoring: older students help younger ones.

A Health & Care

- Collaboration with GGD Kennemerland.
- Health check-ups for 5-year-olds and group 7 students.
- Parents can contact the youth nurse or doctor directly.

- First contact the teacher, then the school leadership.
- Internal and external confidential advisors are available.

■ Group 8 Graduates

- 21 students graduated.
- Most went to HAVO/VWO (28.5%) and VMBO Kader (19%).
- No students moved to special or practical education.

✓ Key Developments

- Quality Assurance: Teachers used block planning and test analysis to improve education.
- **Data-Driven Teaching**: Pre- and post-tests were used to monitor and adjust learning.
- **Group Reviews**: Quarterly meetings between teachers and internal supervisors.
- **Citizenship**: A policy plan was developed focusing on democratic values and social skills.
- **Social Safety**: Students feel safe; the school scored an 8 in satisfaction surveys.
- **Dalton Development**: Positively reviewed by the Dutch Dalton Association.
- **Reading Promotion**: New books and reading activities with a focus on citizenship.
- **Enrichment Groups**: For (gifted) students, focusing on executive functions like perseverance and collaboration.
- **Pilot Mixed-Age Groups**: Groups 5-6-7 worked together on creative projects. Well-received but paused due to time constraints.

Outlook for School Year 2025–2026

№ New Building & Integrated Child Center (IKC)

- The school is working toward becoming a Dalton Child Center (DKC).
- Collaboration with childcare provider Partou has begun.
- New building planned by 2030 at the latest.

Staff Development

- Team members are training to become school coaches, language specialists, and excellent school leaders.
- Focus on high expectations: challenging and supporting students to reach their potential.

L Education Quality

- Start of a new language education plan.
- Continued focus on data-driven conversations and action plans.
- Short-cycle teaching: instruction and testing are continuously adapted to student needs.

Early Education

- A fourth kindergarten group will start in January 2026.
- Vision development project for early childhood education.

□ Reading & Language

- Exploring a new reading method for groups 3–8.
- Possible shift to integrated reading education (subjects taught in context).

☀ (Gifted) Education

- The specialist continues to guide enrichment groups.
- Focus on perseverance, learning from mistakes, and collaboration.

Digital Literacy

- Start of a school-wide digital literacy protocol.
- Emphasis on ICT skills, media literacy, and critical thinking.

Dalton Development

- Study days with other Dalton schools.
- Internal focus on Dalton core values per year group.

Student Participation

- Student council and Floreer council remain active.
- Peer tutoring and mediation continue.
